Who am I?

What do we want?

Why are we here?

What are we called to do?

Basic questions humans have been seeking since time began

Even before time began

Angels asked the same things

Some sought the answers away from God

And sin became a reality

Our first parents asked the same questions

But they sought the answers in the wrong places

And sin entered the world

Throughout history

Men and women have sought the answers

Many have found the answer

Many have turned down the wrong path

Many have found the path

But struggle to stay on it

There are also those that never ask these questions

They are too busy with work

Too busy with distractions

Too busy to think of anything beyond the here and now

But for those that do search

The answer is found in Jesus Christ

It is within Jesus' answer to Andrew and John:

Come and see

What are you looking for?

What am I looking for?

We can become confused when we seek answers away from Christ

Because we see what we are

We know what we have done in the past

But Christ goes beyond that

Jesus became man to show us who we are

To show us who we can become

He knows our past

But he points us to the future

It doesn't matter if we are a child like Samuel

An old man like Eli

Or somewhere in the middle like the apostles

Christ speaks to our hearts, and calls them to be like his

But for us to hear, we have to get sin out of the way

St Paul tells us

Our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit

He was writing to the Corinthians

A society that has much in common with the modern world

Sexual promiscuity was prominent and accepted as normal

But St Paul tells us our bodies do matter

Jesus Christ became human

He was incarnate; he had a physical body

He has a resurrected human body

This gives our bodies a special dignity in God's eyes

They are temples of the Holy Spirit

They are the way we offer sacrifice and prayer

We enter into a special union with Christ in and through our bodies

They are the means by which we consume His body and Blood

God Himself dwells in us

We use our bodies to glorify God

And as temples, we are called to keep them pure

When our hearts are free from sin

We can more clearly hear the voice of God

Our readings have 2 examples of how we hear God's voice

For some, they hear Him directly

Like Samuel, we need to have an open, attentive heart

To be ready to respond if this grace comes our way

But even here, it is good to bring this to another

To someone like Eli, who can help our understanding

For most, though, we are pointed to God

Like John the Baptist instructing his disciples

Behold, the Lamb of God

He points out the Christ to Andrew and John

Most of us were brought to Christ by others

By our parents, bringing us for baptism

Where the Christian seeds are planted

By our teachers, our community and family

Whether we are actively studying

Being in a catechism class

Reading the lives of the saints

Sometimes we simply watch others

Seeing how they react to events in their lives

We are given witnesses

Others who point us to Christ

Then, when we know him, we bring others to him

So how do we answer these basic questions of humanity?

Who am I?

Why am I here?

What am I to do with my life?

The old Baltimore catechism has an answer

We are called to know God

To love Him

To serve Him

To be happy with him in this life and the next

This is a call to be a disciple

A follower of Christ

It is a call to each and every one of us

It is not something for only a few special people

Look at the first disciples

Normal, everyday, hardworking people

People who heard the invitation to follow God

Whether they heard it directly like Samuel

Or whether the way was pointed out to them

The invitation comes when and where God desires

It comes in the ordinariness of everyday life

It might even seem too ordinary

We might even miss it if we are not attentive

But when it comes, we are called to discern

Like Samuel spending time with Eli

The disciples going to Christ's home

Spending time with him

He tells Andrew and John

Come and you will see

He invites us to spend time with him in prayer

To open our hearts to him

So we can see who we are

So we can see who we are called to be

When we do this, there will be a transformation

We will experience a conversion

We will be able to say the words of Samuel

Speak Lord, for your servant is listening

We become his disciple

To our family

To our friends

To our community

We begin to follow where he leads

Because we know in the end

He is leading us home

Lord, where are you staying?

Come, and see
